# Northwest Vermont Employment Challenges Survey Report

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### Summary

A cross-sector team of Vermont organizations and municipalities, called the Northwest Team, joined forces in 2019 to participate in a grant competition called the Working Communities Challenge (WCC) supported by the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston (FRBB) and funded by the State of Vermont, and others.

The team's goal in the WCC was to help Northwest region residents find, gain, and sustain good employment and achieve economic success. The team planned to accomplish this by examining the systemic issues in society, employment, and government and how equitable change can be made to support the unique needs of every individual. The team saw, and still sees, the Formidable Four employment challenges as barriers to successful employment: transportation, child care, housing, and substance use disorder. Problems with internet and technology access were also identified as a challenge.

The team decided to survey Franklin and Grand Isle residents about employment challenges to determine which challenge(s) was the greatest concern, discover insights into these problems, and gather ideas for solutions. This data would help the team decide where to focus. Paper copies of the survey with self-addressed and stamped envelopes and the online survey were widely shared. The Employment Challenges Survey received 185 individual responses. This report gives an overview of the results as a whole and also divides the survey respondents and their answers into ten cohorts based on income level.

The following summarizes some key data points and conclusions:

- Based on demographic majorities, a common demographic profile for a survey respondent could be someone that lives and works in Franklin and/or Grand Isle counties, is employed full-time, is 36 to 45 years old, and has a household composition of two adults with dependents.
- The income level which included the most respondents was the >\$91,000 cohort (18.68%). The survey data supports the conclusion that this cohort still experiences employment challenges despite high income. For example, child care was the major challenge for this cohort with the cost of child care receiving the most votes.
- The question which asked about the frequency of internet and technology access issues was the only question the majority of respondents (63.19%) have problems at least "Once in a While."
- While the rest of the frequency of challenges questions had "Never" majority responses, it is important to consider the percentages that had challenges at least "Once in a While":
  - Transportation 35.75%
  - Child Care 36.31%
  - Housing 26.97%
  - Substance Use Disorder 8.43%
- These were the most frequent choices for the biggest challenge within the Formidable Four and technology/internet access:
  - Transportation "Cost of car ownership"
  - Internet and Technology Access "Access to low-cost technology"
  - Child Care "Cost of child care"
  - Housing "No affordable housing"
  - Substance Use Disorder N/A (with "Resources for recovery" second)

- Respondents said the resources and ideas that would be most helpful are more/better public transportation options, more providers/options and availability for child care, more affordable housing, and more local resources for substance use recovery.
- When asked which topics leaders should be addressing, good/livable wage and a needing to make the minimum wage higher was the greatest concern.
- Child care was the greatest challenge for respondents and the greatest challenge in Franklin and Grand Isle counties. However, transportation was selected as the Formidable Four the region is best equipped to tackle.
- The team wanted to ensure we received answers from low-income individuals especially those without internet/technology access and the paper survey distribution was part of that strategy. As a result, 13/16 respondents with an income of <\$10,000 and 12/17 respondents with an income of \$11,000-\$20,000 submitted paper surveys. The number of paper responses decreases as income increases.</li>

The main conclusion the team took from this survey's data is that there are common employment challenges and perceptions of these problems across income levels and that challenges are largely dependent on each individual's situation. The team had anticipated that housing would be the major challenge, but respondents had the most concerns around child care.

Throughout the survey data, there are many common themes in all the Formidable Four and income levels, though not always shown as a majority, that should be mentioned including frustrations about the following:

- Income limits for assistance and the benefit cliff
- Not knowing where to look for help and resources
- Stigmas around getting help
- Bad credit and not having a license
- Age and the hiring process
- Concerning substance use/dealing in neighborhoods and safe affordable housing
- Lack of support for the working poor
- More activities in the community to serve as substance use disorder prevention and activities that are recovery friendly
- Mental health and maintaining work/life balance

## Introduction

A cross-sector team of organizations and municipalities, called the Northwest Team, joined forces in 2019 to participate in a grant competition called the Working Communities Challenge (WCC) supported by the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston (FRBB) and funded by the State of Vermont, and others. The WCC was created to support efforts that build healthy and strong economies and communities in rural VT – especially efforts that benefit low-income residents. It encourages regional partnerships and focuses on the following core elements as a foundation for the work of participating communities: collaborative leadership, community engagement, learning orientation, systems change, and diversity. The Northwest

Team represented Franklin and Grand Isle counties, and the Northwest Regional Planning Commission (NRPC) was the lead organization.

The WCC was divided into a planning phase and an implementation phase; The Northwest Team was one of eight teams to receive a \$20,000 planning grant to work toward the \$300,000 implementation funds which would be used over the span of three years. Only four teams would receive implementation funds. The team's goal in the WCC was to help the region's residents find, gain, and sustain good employment and achieve economic success. The team planned to accomplish this by looking at the systemic issues in society, employment, and government and how equitable change can be made to support the unique needs of every individual. The team saw the Formidable Four employment challenges as barriers to successful employment: transportation, child care, housing, and substance use disorder.

One of the first steps in The Northwest Team's planning process was to survey Franklin and Grand Isle residents about the Formidable Four to determine which employment challenge(s) was the greatest concern, discover insights into these problems, and gather ideas for solutions. This would help the team decide where to place focus in the implementation phase. This report summarizes the results of the Employment Challenges Survey.

The Northwest Team was not one of the four Vermont teams to receive a WCC implementation grant, but the team is still continuing to meet and work together to address the Formidable Four.

## **Methods**

The Employment Challenges Survey was designed in SurveyMonkey and included 31 questions about demographics, each of the Formidable Four, and the Formidable Four holistically (copy of blank survey in Appendix). Internet/technology access was also identified as a challenge.


There were two main methods of survey distribution:

- 1. Paper surveys with addressed and stamped envelopes were handed out to residents to complete and mail back to the NRPC. Some of the locations included the following:
  - All of the food shelves in Franklin and Grand Isle counties.
  - Northwestern Medical Center handed them out to staff.
  - St. Albans Free Library kept a table of them for patrons.
  - Food drop locations in St. Albans and Richford.
- 2. The survey was shared and advertised with the SurveyMonkey link both online and on paper flyers. The flyers were posted all throughout Franklin and Grand Isle, and the link was shared widely online and advertised through Front Porch Forum.


The team used some of the planning grant to give each food shelf funds to purchase basic needs – nonfood items such as personal hygiene items and cleaning supplies – for their clientele during the pandemic. This fostered a connection between the team, food shelves, and food shelf clientele. The team also included a raffle with the survey; all respondents had a chance to win one of 15 \$25 VISA gift cards. The Employment Challenges Survey received 185 individual responses. Of that number, 56 responses were paper surveys mailed back to NRPC. This report gives an overview of the results as a whole and also divides the survey respondents and their answers into ten cohorts based on their income level. The separation makes it possible to compare answers based on respondents' income level while also seeing majority answers from all respondents. The "All Respondents Data" section of this report displays quantitative data visually and summarizes open-ended questions based on themes most frequently mentioned. In the "Cohort Data" section, quantitative data is condensed into majority answers, and themes from the open-ended answers are summarized in more detail.


Most questions in the Employment Challenges Survey were required, but the open-ended questions were not required. Therefore, many of the questions have varying numbers of responses. Some of the required questions were not answered by all respondents because any question could be skipped on the paper version. Additionally, respondents could choose more than one option for some questions. Please note that in order to focus on what respondents had to share for resources, perspectives, and ideas, majority counts for open-ended questions do not include ambiguous comments such as "None," "N/A," or "I don't know" (unless otherwise specified or if the respondent provided specification). These generic answers in the context of the different open-ended questions can be interpreted in innumerable ways and cannot be translated into accurate counts without potential misinterpretation.



### All Respondents: Demographic Data Profile












### All Respondents: Transportation and Technology Data Profile







### All Respondents: Substance Use Recovery and Employment Cycle Data Profile










An experience with child care (mentioned 18 times), mostly frustrating experiences. The most popular source of frustration was COVID-19 challenges and the cost of child care.

#### <u>Cohort One:</u> Annual Household Income <\$10,000







#### <u>Cohort Three</u>: Annual Household Income \$21,000-\$30,000

This cohort includes all of the respondents that answered "\$21,000-\$30,000" to the annual household income question for a total of eighteen (18) people or 9.89% of the 182 respondents who answered the income question.





"Lack of recovery-friendly opportunities in my area" received second most votes (7) for greatest substance use recovery challenge "Other" received most votes (10) with 8 specifying N/A and 2 commenting the following:

-Respondent has seen people who have not been able to access care because they earn too much money and their insurance doesn't cover the cost of in-patient care.

-There are no recovery meetings of any kind in Alburgh. When people first go to the treatment clinic in St. Albans, they have to go every day for a few months before they can start going every 2 days and less. For those first 3 or 4 months or more depending on how well they're doing in treatment, it is very costly and timely to get to the clinic every day; people can't go if they don't have a vehicle. Or if the clinic is having technical difficulties, it can make people late for work.







Looking for "affordable" housing is a nightmare. Many places are around \$1,000 a month for a 1 or 2 bedrooms with nothing included and no pets allowed. Trying to find anything over 2 bedrooms is nearly impossible. Many people spend over half of their income (or even 2/3) maintaining a place to sleep. Respondent is not legally handicapped and has not sought certification and hopes to not have to. However, respondent does not qualify for assistance without certification. Respondent can work part time and stay injury- free, but most jobs are out of reach because of injuries. When working part time, respondent doesn't qualify for insurance but makes too much to qualify for health care assistance.

Respondent previously worked in human services and finds the current wages and availability/options for substance use treatment appalling. The effort put into providing medication-only treatment is a band-aid for the cause and effects of addiction. This impacts the entire community.










