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Grand Isle Mutual Aid Meeting
GI-REMC
June 5, 2023 – Draft Minutes
Grand Isle County Sheriff's Department and Virtual

The meeting began at 7:02 p.m. followed by roll call. Ron chaired the meeting.

Changes to Agenda

None.

US Coast Guard

Adam reported that he met with USCG in Burlington previously to start an open dialogue how we can help each other. One of the things the USCG asked was to always use Channel 23 for dispatch for marine rescue calls. They will add us to their system.

Colby reported that USCG takes 40 minutes to get to entrance of Mallet's Bay and 45 minutes to the tip of South Hero. It take approximately 1 ½ to 2 hours for anything further north of passage.

USCG has two 29-foot aluminum boats and one 45-foot aluminum boat. The largest issue now is staffing. Generally, they have 4 people on duty which is the bare minimum for a boat. During winter months they have a full ice rescue team. They can rescue only surface level people and are unable to retrieve below the surface. They do not retrieve vehicles or equipment.

USCG Burlington has no local aircraft. In the event one is needed, it takes 1 – 1 ½ hours for response to arrive due to the time it takes to assemble crew and go through mandatory equipment checks.

Channel 16 is being monitored all the time and the station phone is manned 24x7. If you need a boat or aircraft, that is a station level decision. Aircraft comes from Maine.

Currently working through legal parameters for getting lights on rescue trucks. Lighting is an internal coast guard issue related to training and experience of staff. In the event the crew is needed, USCG will get there as soon as possible however they are beholden to more traffic laws than a first response vehicle so it will likely take longer to arrive.

The USCG has a 229 which can be trailered. Recently it was trailered up to Apple Island marina from Burlington in order to cut response time from the Lake.

Normally USCG operates on half hour checks during normal operations. In the event of running something in tandem with local response, they would conduct half hour checks at a minimum.

USCG generally takes the lead for search and rescue operations on the lake. They would become on-scene coordinator and South Portland Main sector would take SAR Command. It happened last year during a capsized boat response in the southern end of Lake. The coordination there worked out but there can always be improvement. For law enforcement, USCG will look to local LE for expertise.

52 Ron thanked Colby and noted that it would be helpful to have a Coast Guard representative participate
53 in future meetings occasionally. Colby thanked everyone for the opportunity and hopes to attend the
54 next meeting to improve inter-agency relationships.

56 **Grand Isle County Peer Support Group - Chuck Halse, South Hero Rescue**

57 The group recently took a 32-hour training class on acute stress and peer support. First line workers and
58 front-line workers are at higher risk for mental health disorders than the general public. They are less
59 likely to seek help than the general public. The group's goal is providing peer support to first responders
60 and their families, support individuals and crews of first response agencies, to provide periodic check-ins
61 with crews and facilitate well-being, to provide contact with specialists and counselors who deal with
62 trauma and to help prepare for situations rather than react to them.

63

64 He distributed information for the departments and noted he would be reaching out to each of the
65 chiefs. They are not therapists or counselors but there to offer information on who can assist them.

66

67 There was a brief discussion on EMDR (eye moving desensitization and reprogramming). Basically, when
68 you are on scene, the thinking side of your brain processes in one way and your emotional side
69 processes another and the two don't talk to each other which leads to anxiety, nightmares, etc. A
70 trained counselor can help reprogram the information so you are not in mental stress. The group can
71 help get you to a counselor who is trained in this.

72

73 Harry added that some studies prove that talking about trauma on the day of can significantly help how
74 your brain process the information compared to going to sleep at night and waiting for a future time to
75 process it. Chuck noted they are trained with the EMD part but are associated with with [Vermont Center
76 for Responder Wellness](#) (Sonny Provetto who is a former state trooper, EMDR clinician and a trauma
77 consultant for police departments and emergency responders nationwide).

81 **VEM Update**

82 Harry Schoppmann introduced himself as the new NW Regional Coordinator and provided his
83 background and types of support he can provide including plans, resource information, training and also
84 serves as one of four watch officers for the State EOC. If a community needs to stand up an emergency
85 operations center, they can call VEM and ask for Harry to support local operations. His background is
86 NYC fireman and fire chief for Underhill.

87

88 Shaun noted that the Sheriff's Office is the County EOC if there were a county-wide disaster.

89

90 VEM Conference is on Sept 21. At Burke Mountain Resort. Each REMC can have one free room for the
91 night.

92

93 Eric Forand is the interim Director until a new Director is found.

94

95 There's \$8 million in mitigation funding available.

99 For the REMC, the new language for quorum was passed by the legislature recently (20% of
100 municipalities). Shaun gave the background of LEPC13 as subcommittee of GICMAA. Harry gave an
101 overview of committee membership REMC are eligible for.

102

103 *Ray Allen made a motion to form the GI-REMC. Mike Murdock seconded. Motion carried.*

105 **REMC Election of Officers**

106 GICMAA decided to have the President and Vice president serve as Chair and Vice Chair for REMC. No
107 one volunteered to serve on any of the state committee at this time.

108

109 **Bylaw Updates**

110 Shaun reviewed the bylaw changes that were distributed previously including replacing LEPC 13 and
111 REMC, meeting frequency, and adding following Vermont's Open Meeting Law requirements.

112 *Mike Murdock motioned to adopt the updated GICMAA Bylaws with the amendment of adding REMC*
113 *quorum of 5. Ron Kumetz seconded. Motion carried.*

114

115 **Vermont Dept of Health – Jacquie Kelley, Northern EP**

116 Jacquie reported she has been working with regional partners on addressing the needs of homelessness
117 in Franklin and Grand Isle Counties, especially with hotel voucher program sunsetting on May 1 and June
118 1. This led to a discussion on homelessness in Grand Isle County. Ray noted there aren't any homeless
119 camps similar to Chittenden County and Franklin County. He recommended contacting the State Parks.

120

121 There has been a lot of conversation around cooling shelters. There are cooling sites located on VDH
122 website. Champlain Valley Office of Economic Opportunity and the United Way are inquiring about
123 cooling shelters with information on services and resources. Shaun noted that through support from
124 Jared at VDH, a lot of hot weather planning was conducted last year. One of the questions that came up
125 was whether the MRC would be available to support the cooling shelter either to help manage or
126 conduct wellness checks. They would need training to staff a shelter but they can support a shelter with
127 wellness checks. Contact the VEM Watch Officer. Ray added that he would contact the Red Cross and
128 get support from Angie Robinson who volunteers for Red Cross and lives nearby. The islands have lots
129 of cooling sites.

130

131 Adam asked who he should contact for Narcan supplies for crews. Jacquie will have someone from VDH
132 follow up.

134 **GICMAA**

136 **Minutes** – *Ron motioned to accept the minutes. Pat seconded. Motion carried.*

137

138 **Treasurer's Report** – No report.

139

140 Bill to Present - Shaun reported that the Treasurer e-mailed the latest statements and invoices which
141 were e-mailed earlier.

142

143 *Mike made a motion to have the Treasurer pay the billing for Dispatch. Pat seconded. Motion carried.*

144

145 Mike added that a report would have the bi-monthly financial outlook and breakdown of incoming and
146 outgoing funding.

147

148 **Critical Incident Response Team** - Pat reported he has been working with Ray on creating a Team and
149 handed out the SOGs. Basically, the team would be called out to support an active threat event as
150 requested by Sheriff's Department. Members will respond to their respective stations and mount a
151 response to the scene on marked apparatus. He presented an overview of the program. Ray noted one
152 of his deputy's (Erick) recently attended an active shooter training course the state put on.

153

154 There was a discussion about the draft SOGs. The group will review the SOGs and offer input at the next
155 meeting.

157 **Department Updates**

158 Ron was approached recently by Hero’s fund which raises a lot of money for first response
159 organizations. They have a simple grant process awards up to \$2,000 for 501 (c)3 organizations. Ron
160 will send out the information to everyone. The grant period ends June 30.
161

162 **County Emergency Services Administrator Position**

163 Bill reviewed past attempts on creating the position. He discussed the need for the position and sought
164 support for creating and funding the position through an ad hoc committee. The position would help
165 with coordination and support of fire and EMS including trainings, grant support and coordination of
166 activities. The group discussed creation of a job description, salary, list of duties, oversight, liability and
167 outreach to selectboards. The group supported the idea but wanted to ensure the details would be
168 worked out before going out to Selectboards. Previous efforts targeted a salary of \$20k. Harry
169 mentioned that when he was a chief, grants and FEMA funding following disasters could be used to help
170 pay for the position.
171

172 Committee volunteers included Ron Kumetz, Nancy Frantz, Adam White and Bill Baron. Bill will
173 coordinate meetings.
174

175 **Other Business**

176 Ron introduced and welcomed Pete Brescia from newly formed Alburgh Rescue to the group. Mike
177 asked about the Bylaws and Mutual Aid Agreement. The Mutual Aid Agreement actually lists Alburgh
178 Rescue and the bylaws only list Clarenceville Noyan FD by name.
179

180 Mike reported that Front Line Females camp will be held this summer and they have a list of items
181 needed. He will send those to Shaun. Ron added that the second annual *Female Frontline Camp* will be
182 held in July. They have lots of donations. It would be great if chiefs showed up on closing ceremony to
183 support their efforts. They asked Ron to reach out to media outlets.
184

185 Mike is working on hosting an EV course for the County. Waiting for dates from the instructor.
186

187 Mike noted that GICMAA is no longer a 501(c)3.
188

189 Ray added the Allenholm Farm will be hosting a first responder appreciation event on Aug. 12 from 10
190 am to 2 pm. An invite will be sent out later.

192 **Public Comment - None.**

194 **Adjourn - Ray motioned to adjourn. Pat seconded. Motion carried.**
